

SLOVENIA - From Curiosity to Confidence

"I see now what I could not see then. I see why Jesus died for me, and I believe in Him and trust Him as my Savior." That's what Erika shared after finishing our "Genesis to Jesus" Bible Discovery series. We've known Erika for several years. While she was in university, she and Zina had studied the Bible together, but as a cultural Catholic, the message of salvation as a free gift never quite clicked. Looking back now, Erika reflected, "I see now!"

"Genesis to Jesus" takes people through 22 passages of the Bible, from Creation to the Cross, helping them to see the overall narrative of the Bible, our sin, and need of a savior. We had been working through the study with Erika and her boyfriend, Miha. When we started, Miha described the Catholic faith of people he grew up around as "hypocritical, judgmental, and argumentative." He identified as agnostic, but even early on we could tell his heart was softening.

As we moved through the passages, both Erika and Miha shared honest observations and took personal, sometimes profound steps of application. At one point, Miha told us, "At church, they just tell you what you have to believe. But here, we can really talk about it, think about it, and understand it for ourselves."

When we finished the final passage, we asked them where they stood. Miha said, "I do believe, and I want Jesus to be my Savior." That night, both Miha and Erika prayed out loud, each expressing their faith in Christ. We celebrated with them, encouraged them in their new journey with Jesus, and discussed next steps for growing in faith. They shared how thankful they were to walk this journey together—and we are too.

Pray With Us

Pray for Erika and Miha as they begin their new walk with Jesus—that they would grow in faith, remain rooted in God's Word, and boldly share the hope they've found. Pray also that their relationship would be shaped by God's love and reflect His character.

Pray for our family as we wrap up our time in Texas and begin our travels to Ohio. Ask God for energy, focus, and peace as we juggle a full schedule. Pray especially for the boys—that they would have patience, find joy in the change of pace, enjoy the long car rides, and feel peace during our many meetings.

A BIBLE STUDY ABOUT GIDEON, AN OBSCURE JUDGE

About this Month's Bible Study: The Old Testament Book of Judges is one of the more difficult books of the Bible to read and understand. The book presents a series of stories about how the Israelites suffered calamities and oppression and how God choose Judges to lead them by defeating their enemies. These stories teach us lessons about how God deals with his people. This month's study uses the story of Judge Gideon to teach us one of these lessons. *Gary Anderson*



Judges 6:11-16 (NIV) GOD CALLED GIDEON TO BE AN ISRAELITES LEADER

- 11 The angel of the LORD came and sat down under the oak in Ophrah that belonged to Joash the Abiezrite, where his son Gideon was threshing wheat in a winepress to keep it from the Midianites. 12 the angel of the LORD appeared to Gideon, he said, "The LORD is with you, mighty warrior."
- 13 "Pardon me, my lord," Gideon replied, "but if the LORD is with us, why has all this happened to us? Where are all his wonders that our ancestors told us about when they said, 'Did not the LORD bring us up out of Egypt?' But now the LORD has abandoned us and given us into the hand of Midian."
- 14 The LORD turned to him and said, "Go in the strength you have and save Israel out of Midian's hand. Am I not sending you?"
- 15 "Pardon me, my lord," Gideon replied, "but how can I save Israel? My clan is the weakest in Manasseh, and I am the least in my family."
- 16 The LORD answered, "I will be with you...

Judges were charismatic Israelite leaders who served as military leaders during the years when the Israelites were attempting to occupy the "promised land" and establish homes for their people. The Biblical stories about these leaders are mostly found in the Book of Judges. During this period, roughly 1,400 BCE to 1,100 BCE, Israel was at best a confederation of tribes, not yet a nation. The Judges' stories followed a cyclical pattern. The Israelites would turn away from God and worship the gods of the peoples whose lands they occupied. The Israelites then suffered severe

hardships as a result of God's punishment for their apostasy, usually through oppression by those peoples. When the Israelites cried out to God to be rescued, He would choose a Judge from one of the Israelite tribes who, with God's support, would then conquer and usually slaughter the people who oppressed them. The succession of 15 Judges who succeeded Joshua included six so-called major Judges: Othniel, Ehud, Deborah (yes, there was a woman judge), Gideon, Jephthat, and Samson. Eli and Samuel were the last Judges before Saul, the first King. In this Bible study we will consider the Gideon story in Judges 6-8 to help us

understand how God answers his people's

calls to be rescued from oppression by calling Judges to lead their rescue from oppression.

The Gideon story took place during a time when the Israelites were being oppressed by a people called the Midianites. After Deborah led them to victory over the Canaanites, Israel had enjoyed forty years of peace until, "The Israelites did evil in the eyes of the LORD, and for seven years he gave them into the hands of the Midianites" (v6:1). The Midianites ruined the Israelite crops and slaughtered their livestock. Things were so bad the Israelites took to hiding in mountain caves to escape Midianite wrath. The Israelites had ample reason to ask God to rescue them.

The Angel of the Lord. God used angels as messengers to deliver His calls to his chosen several times. Angels of the Lord appeared to Abraham and Moses. In the New Testament, Angels brought messages to Elizabeth and Mary, the mother of Jesus. When the Angel appeared to Gideon, he was terribly frightened because "I have seen the Angel of the Lord face to face" (v.6:22). But the Lord reassured him, "Peace! Do not be afraid" (v6:11).

Gideon's Protest. Gideon didn't respond immediately the Lord's call. He said, "I can't do this, my tribe is the least in Israel and I am the least in my family." The Lord's response, "I will be with you." (v6:15).

Gideon's Demand for a Sign. Gideon was still not convinced he was talking to the Lord, "give me a sign that it is really you." After special preparations, the Angel gave a sign with fire and disappeared (v6:17). This Greek Orthodox icon celebrates the Judge Gideon and his Despite Gideon's resistance, God was patient; he did not give up on Gideon.

Gideon Finally Acted as God Instructed him. The Gideon story goes on to tell how Gideon's first actions, cutting down a Baal altar and an Asherah pole were done in the dark of night because he was fearful of reprisals from the people. When he finally took on the Midianites in real battle, he used deception (three-hundred trumpets, etc.) to achieve ultimate victories over the Midianites.

Only God should be our ruler. After Gideon led the Israelites to victory over the Midianites, they invited him to become their king and found a dynasty. Gideon refused, he told them, "I will not rule over you, nor will my son rule over you. The Lord will rule over you" (v8:24).

Gideon's response to God's call was typical of how so many of us respond when our church asks people to step forward and assume leadership roles. We say we are not capable of fulfilling those responsibilities, even as God promises, "I will be with you." Our faith in God's presence is weak, we want God to give us a sign that He is real. When we finally realize God is calling us to do something, we will try to act in the dark of night, so we won't arouse the ire of other. But Gideon shows us that no matter how much we resist God's call, God will not give up on us, just as God did not give up on Gideon.
