NEWS FROM SLOVENIA... God Is on the Move Across EUROPE...With Love From Jay and Zina

We're back in Slovenia after a wonderful summer in the States, encouraged and energized by our time with many of you. Being responsible to raise all our financial support its not always easy but having such generous ministry partners and friends is a great blessing. We are so grateful of all the way you bless our ministry, our family, and encourage our spiritual growth. Thank you so much!

Shortly after returning, we and our whole team had the privilege of attending the first-ever All-European Cru Staff Conference in Berlin. Over 2,000 staff from more than 45 countries gathered together for a week of worship, vision, and equipping. As I stood in the crowded room, I thought of the hundreds of ministry partners we have—and the many we were able to reconnect with this summer. Then I looked around and saw all the staff around us: hundreds of thousands of believers, all playing their part in seeing the gospel reach the lost across Europe.

Berlin was a fitting location for the event because thirty-five years ago, it was where East and West reunited. For us, it marked the first time our staff—previously separated into two regional areas—came together as one region, united by one vision: helping fulfill the Great Commission and Great Commandment in every corner of Europe.

One especially encouraging story came from the team preparing to move to Norway this coming April. For years, Norway has been the largest country in Europe without Cru staff. After a vision trip last fall (which Zina joined), a team 5 staff from Moldova has committed to move and begin student ministry there. This is a direct answer to prayer—and a major step toward launching gospel movements everywhere. Please join us in praying for staff to be raised up for other unreached nations in Europe, including Iceland, Luxembourg, Bosnia, and Denmark, where there is currently no long-term presence.

Zina also had the privilege of helping lead a coaching workshop during the conference, with more than 60 staff in attendance. These coaching skills are a vital tool for ministry, helping staff multiply their impact by equipping and empowering others. Many were deeply encouraged by the experience, and we're excited to see how God will continue to use these tools through the FOCOS team that Zina serves with.

A BIBLE STUDY ABOUT SAMUEL, THE LAST OF THE JUDGES

Samuel was the last of the Old Testament Judges before Israel began its first tragic experiences with a king (Saul). Like Moses, Samuel served as a Priest, Prophet, and Judge. Samdedicated by his mother to a life of service to God, his uel's birth, his being leadership in defeating the Philistines and his prudent administration of jus-

tice make him worthy of our study of the leaders of God's people. Gary Anderson



I Samuel 1:20, 24, 28 (NIV)

 20 So in the course of time Hannah became pregnant and gave birth to a son. She named him Samuel, saying, "Because I asked the LORD for him."

 24 After he was weaned, she took the boy with her, young as he was, along with a three-year-old bull, an ephah of flour and a skin of wine, and brought him to the house of the LORD at Shiloh.

 27 I prayed for this child, and the LORD has granted me what I asked of him. 28 So now I give him to the LORD. For his whole life he will be given over to the LORD."

Like Sarah, the mother of Isaac, and Elizabeth, the mother of John the Baptist, Samuel's mother Hannah was well past child-bearing age when God answered her fervent pleas to conceive and give

birth to a child. Like Samson the Judge, Samuel's mother dedicated him to the service of the Lord at a very early age. When Samuel was born, Hannah regarded him as a gift from God and vowed to dedicate him to the service of the LORD. After he was weaned, she took her child to the temple at Shiloh where, "the boy ministered before the LORD under Eli the Priest" (I Sa. 2:11).

I Samuel 3:10-13 (NIV)

 10 The LORD came and stood there, calling as at the other times, "Samuel! Samuel!" Then Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

¹¹And the LORD said to Samuel: "See, I am about to do something in Israel that will make the ears of everyone who hears about it burn. ¹²At that time I will carry out against Eli everything I spoke against his family—from beginning to end. ¹³For I told him that I would judge his family forever because of the sin he knew about; his sons blasphemed God, and he failed to restrain them.

The setting for Samuel's first major episode as a priest trainee occurred because Eli's sons, who might have succeeded him, were wicked and corrupt. They were enriching themselves off the sacrifices people brought to the shrine at Shiloh. One of the more delightful stories in the Old Testament is 1st Samuel's account of God calling

the young boy Samuel to inform him about his plans to destroy the house of Eli because of its corruption. At night, while Samuel slept, God called "Samuel, Samuel" three times. Each time Samuel thought it was Eli who called him, and each time Eli said, "I did not call; go back and lie down." But after the third time, Eli realized it was God who was calling Samuel and advised him to respond to God by saying, "Speak, for your servant is listening." God then informed the young boy of his plans for the house of Eli. Eli asked Samuel what God had told him "so Samuel told him everything." The story continues by reporting that "The LORD continued to appear at Shiloh, and there he revealed himself to Samuel through his word. And Samuel's word came to all Israel (I Sa. 3:21, 4:1). Samuel became a Prophet.

I Samuel 7:5-6, 10, 15 (NIV)

 5 Then Samuel said, "Assemble all Israel at Mizpah, and I will intercede with the LORD for you." ⁶When they had assembled at Mizpah, they drew water and poured it out before the LORD. On that day they fasted and there they confessed, "We have sinned against the LORD." Now Samuel had become a Judge over the people of Israel at Mizpah.

 10 While Samuel was sacrificing the burnt offering, the Philistines drew near to engage Israel in battle. But that day the LORD thundered with loud thunder against the Philistines and threw them into such a panic that they were routed before the Israelites.

 15 Samuel continued as Israel's leader all the days of his life. 16 From year to year he went on a circuit from Bethel to Gilgal to Mizpah, judging Israel in all those places.

The story of Samuel continued with reports about escalating Philistine attacks against the Israelites. Eli's sons were killed in one of these attacks and a then elderly Eli died. The Philistines captured the Ark of God which supposedly contained the Mosaic tablet and represented the presence of God. By then Samuel had grown to become a leader. In addition to serving as a Prophet, he had now "become a Judge over the people of Israel at Mizpah." Under Samuel's leadership, and with God fighting for the Israelites, the Philistines were defeated. "For as long as Samuel lived, the Philistines ceased to be a threat" (I Sa. 7:13). Samuel continued to serve God and the people by going from city to city hearing appeals and administering justice.

The story of Samuel tells us a lot about what God expects from the leaders of his people. First, they must listen when God speaks. Leaders must pray for their people and inspire them to follow God, both through personal examples and by proclaiming the word of God to them. And in their everyday lives, A 17th century icon of Samuel leaders must always work for justice, encouraging the people to do what is right, according to God's teachings.
