#### Grace Lutheran Church Council met on February 15, 2024.

**Treasurer's Report** The January Treasurer's Report was presented to the council. We had strong income for the month of January, setting us up for a surplus to start the year. Two additional CD's were opened. We are also looking at Mission Investments through the ELCA. A motion was made by Steve, second Joan to approve the Treasurer's Report. Motion carried. **Pastor's Report** - Pastor Jaci Please pray for the family of my cousin, Bethany Collier. She recently passed away and this has been a long and difficult journey for her and our family.

**Board of Congregational Life New Business:** We welcomed Karen Hammel, who led a discussion about providing food and set-up for a concert to be given by The Avenue Trio, a Christian music trio from Nashville. The concert will start in the Grace Sanctuary on Sunday, April 7, at 4 p.m. Following the concert, we will offer light refreshments to everyone in attendance in the fellowship hall. Food will include cold cuts and cheese to make sandwiches, a veggie tray, chips, and cookies. Karen will handle publicity for the event. This board will help with set-up and clean-up on April 7th, following worship. Easter is March 31 and we will offer a punch and cookie reception. We will set up at 9 am. Board of Education - Our gratitude is extended to Steve Blausey and Steve Avers for their help in preparing classrooms. A new class on Luther started February 4th. The class has been well attended. Future media-based topics include Dietrich Bonhoffer and Jesus Christ Superstar Teachers for the K-6 class in February are Jeff and Deb Boos. The Weitelmans will teach in March. The planning process has begun for starting a Preschool class in September. Board of Property For devotions, a reading about Merlyn Weng was shared with everyone acknowledging what a loss this board has suffered and what a privilege it has been to serve alongside of him. Heaven must have needed him more though. Till we meet again! Old Business: Zak Avers is still working on the elevator phone issue, water testing is going well, and no progress on the bell microphone yet. Miscellaneous: New Business: Steve read a letter from our renter stating that they would be out by Feb. 16th. Some discussion was then held about the future of the parsonage. We will need to have someone take the trash containers out to the curb now and the Avers' have graciously volunteered. Steve Also informed the Board that a new custodian has been hired. **Board** of Witness and Mission: \$760, Council funds donated to WAM Board, sent to Christy's Corner in Elmore. The congregational survey regarding benevolence giving results reviewed. 1) Hunger and Nutrition 2) Children and family services 3)Veterans support 4) Affordable housing, homelessness and shelters Board of Worship Ash Wednesday and Lenten meals or "Dinner Church" wee discussed. Summer Worship will begin on June 2. We'll continue setting out sign-up sheets for lectors and deacons. . There was discussion about going back to serving communal bread and wine. The board decided to go back to this format beginning on February 4. Members still have the options of using the prepackaged communion kits or supplying their own communion elements. An article will be placed in the bulletins and February Parish Reporter, and Joan will make announcements at Sunday worship and the January 28 congregational meeting. **Old Business:** 1) The vacant council positions are: Vice President, Financial Secretary, and Board of Congregational Life. 2) The Constitution was briefly discussed. Suggestions for updates were made. Goals for our Church Council were set A. Maintain financial solvency. B. Restructure how we operate as a congregation as a council C. Evangelism and expanding membership. New Business: Audit committee of Jen Haar and Linda Jacobs was appointed. The Congregational Report of the ELCA was filled out by Mary Schlieveert for the Synod. Gordon brought up the updating of the website. A recognition event is being planned. A Task Force has been formed led by Steve Blausey, to determine how to proceed with the parsonage.

## **News From Slovenia...An Unexpected E-mail**

Over the holidays, I (Jay) received an email unlike any I had ever gotten. It read: "Hello. My name is Žan. I am new in faith and have been discipled by 2 brothers from America. I am feeling alone in the city that I live in because it feels like there is no Christians around me (at least that I know of), so I'm wondering if you could help me." The email was so vague in details, yet specific in its topic, i actually wondered if it was some kind of fishing scheme!

But after a few more emails, it seemed like the real deal, and so my coworker and I drove across the country to meet Žan. He is a 17 year old kid in a small town nearly two hours from Ljubljana. He shared with us his story. As he began high school he struggled with depression. It got so bad he ended up dropping out of high school and said that most days he could not even get out of bed. He looked to video



games for escape, and started playing a Virtual Reality game, which is populated with other real people



playing as avatars and talking to one another, playing games together, and other things. In this game he say one person, whose avatar description said he was a Christian. Žan, not knowing any Christians himself, was curious about this, and started to talk with this person. Eventually, he shared the gospel with Žan, invited him to join him at his VR church, and started discipling him in the game with a friend. One of these two guys works with Cru, and told Žan the he should try to find Cru in Slovenia, and so he found my email, shared it with Žan, and he contacted us. As he shared his story, my coworker and I could hardly believe what we were hearing!

We have since been meeting with him weekly over zoom for discipleship, and together he has read the Bible in Slovene for the first time, and prayed in Slovene for the first time! He has been so teachable, and excited to grow in his faith, and learn how he can share with others the transformational power of the gospel that he himself has experienced.

As we pray, we often reflect on Jesus' words, "The harvest is plentiful," but often in Slovenia we can be

tempted to question in our hearts, is it really? Are there really so many people ready for the harvest? Are there people in every municipality who are seeking God? Well God answered these questions with an emphatic "Yes!" with Žan. God did everything to bring Žan to us, and it has been a privilege seeing his hunger, and passion. When we shared with him our vision, he was so excited to be a part of it, and has been praying earnestly for a group in his municipality.

#### A BIBLE STUDY ABOUT JESUS' CRUCIFIXION

About this Month's Bible Study. The month of March ends on Easter Sunday, the 31st of March. To prepare us for our Easter celebraton, this Bible Study will use one of the world's great works of religious art to focus on the agony of Jesus' crucifixion that preceded his resurrec; on. That work is the central panel of the Isenheim Altar that is now displayed in the Unterlinden Museum in Colmar, France. The



Isenheim Altar was pained by MaJas Grünewald in 1512-1516. It's vivid and gruesome depticton of Jesus suffering and death will help us understand how Jesus suffered so that we could know the joy of the Easter victory

Matthew 27:45-51 45From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. 46And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" 47When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." 48At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. 49But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him." 50Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last. 51At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split.

This passage from Matthew describes the culmination of Jesus crucifixion, his last words and

death. This scene is portrayed in the central panel of the Isenheim Altar. When we begin our approach to Easter by first understanding the agony of Jesus' suffering and the crushing grief of those closest to Jesus, the joy of Jesus' victory over death becomes even greater. Examining that great work of art (on right) will help us do that. Reread the passage from Matthew 27 (above), then look carefully at how this altar scene portrays the moments of Jesus' death. The scene is gruesome; the crown of thorns still brutalizes Jesus; his body is covered with marks of torture; the nails in his hands and feet magnify how grotesque his execution was; his side has been pierced to confirm his death. Grünewald's crucifixion painting is stark and



austere. He distills this momentous event down to its essential elements. The sky is black. The crowds of jeering enemies who shouted "Crucify him! Crucify him!" and the soldiers who executed Jesus are gone. Even the two bandits who were crucified with Jesus are out of the picture. The figures that remain tell stories that are worthy of our deepest thoughts:

**John the Baptist.** The figure on the right who points his finger at Jesus is John the Baptist. John was executed by Herod well before Jesus' death, so his appearance is symbolic. John was the



To comprehend how Jesus died, keep Grünewald's image of the crucified Jesus near you while you read Psalm 22 (Psalm 22 is traditionally intoned at Grace on Maundy Thursday while the altar is stripped).

Messiah's forerunner. In Matthew 11, Jesus said "This is the one about whom it is written: 'I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you." (v11:10-11). John represents the Messianic expectations embodied by Jesus that were now devastated by his death. The Lamb. Look carefully at how the Lamb's right leg encircles a tiny cross as it bleeds into a

chalice. According to Old Testament law, lambs were sacrificed to atone for sin (Lev. 5:6). When Jesus was sacrificed on the cross, he became the "Lamb of God" (John 1:29). The Lamb's blood flowing into the chalice symbolizes the eucharist.

The Perfume Jar. When Jesus arrived at Bethany, Mary Magdalene anointed Jesus'

with the expensive perfume that was in this jar in an act of extreme devotion. When the disciples protested this as unwarranted extravagance, Jesus praised Mary: "She did what she could. She poured perfume on my body beforehand to prepare for my burial" (Mark

14:8). Now the jar sits empty at Mary's feet because she used it to anoint Jesus for his burial.

Mary Magdalene. The person nearest to Jesus on the left is Mary Magdalene. Matthew and Mark both confirm that Mary Magdalene was present during Jesus' crucifixion: 'Many women were there, watching from a distance. They had followed Jesus from Galilee to care for his needs. Among them were Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Joseph, and the mother of Zebedee's sons" (Matt. 27:55). In the altar painting, Mary extends her clasped

hands to Jesus in a plea of anguish. Mary was the first person to have a post-resurrection encounter with Jesus (John 20:14).

Mary, the Mother of Jesus, and John, the Disciple whom Jesus loved. Mary and the Apostle John are embraced in grief. As they witnessed Jesus' death, their lives were changed by what Jesus told them just before his death: "When Jesus saw his mother there, and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to her, "Woman, here is your son," and to the disciple, "Here is your mother" (John 19:25).

This month, as we go through our traditional cycle of Lenten and Easter worship events, our joy over the Easter victory can be enhanced by beginning this cycle with a meditation on how Jesus and those closest to him suffered.
